What is Saturnalia?

Saturnalia is an Ancient Roman holiday in honor of Saturn, a god of wealth and agriculture. The festivities lasted from December 17th through December 23rd. Citizens would make sacrifices, hold banquets, and even masters and slaves reversed roles! Slaves were treated to a meal that would typically only be eaten by their masters. In honor of this tradition, in this season's event, the students get to test the teacher's classical knowledge in a few rounds of upside-down and backwards certamen! In Ancient Roman times, Saturnalia was also a time for free-speech, the wearing of festive masks and brightly colored garments, and gift-giving! December 19th, known as *sigillaria*, was considered to be the day of gift-giving, in which a variety of presents were exchanged, even gag-gifts!
